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REPORT OF SYBAMMC FIELD TRIP TO FILM MUSEUM

DATE: 16TH March, 2022

To gain a deeper understanding of Indian cinemas, the Mass Media Department of Bunts Sangha's S.M Shetty College of Science, Commerce, and Management Studies organized a visit to the National Museum of Indian Cinema on March 16, 2022, led by Films and Communication Professor Chetan Mathur.

The student learned about various filmmaking techniques such as cinematography, visual effects, editing, past vs. present filmmaking techniques, and various filmmaking equipment. They also learned about the history of Indian cinema.

The National Museum of Indian Cinema, which opened recently, is the first of its kind. It is housed in two buildings in the Films Division complex and has a public space where visitors can relax and sit. Gulshan Mahal, a beautifully restored nineteenth-century heritage building, is divided into nine sections that take visitors on a journey through 100 years of Indian cinema. Its collection includes a variety of documents, posters, models/dioramas, multimedia kiosks, and artifacts. The nine sections are divided into two floors and are as follows: The Origin of Cinema, Cinema Comes to India, Indian Silent Film, The Advent of Sound, The Studio Era, The Impact of World War II, Creative Resonance, New Wave, and Beyond, and Regional Cinema. However, the building is not accessible to people with disabilities, as one must climb wooden stairs to reach the first floor.

The four floors of the New Museum Building are home to four fully air-conditioned exhibition halls. Level 1: Gandhi and Cinema; Level 2: Children's Film Studio; Level 3: Technology, Creativity, and Indian Cinema; and Level 4: Cinema Across India are among them. The children's film studio is

a must-see for young audiences and school groups because it provides an immersive experience for children by utilizing interactive elements such as a stop-motion animation studio, a sound effects and mixing studio, a photo studio, and more. Instead of a tour guide, the museum has digital kiosks with old telephone receivers for specific exhibits that visitors can pick up and listen to in three languages. There are also timelines that, where applicable, place India on the global map.

The visit was extremely informative and provided the students with a wealth of information about the history of Indian cinema. The industrial visit to the National Museum of India was undoubtedly an enriching experience for students interested in learning about the film industry.
